The Spring Hill football team kicked off district play by defeating Center 26-18 in the District 4A, division II opening game Friday night.

The Panthers built a big lead and, despite a late rally by Center, were able to hold off the Roughriders for an incredible win.

Troy Duran kicked three field goals in the first half to give the Panthers a 9-6 advantage at the half.

Spring Hill forced two fumbles in the first half which were recovered by Layne Patterson and Jantzen Lee.

Duran then kicked a 25-yard field goal in the third quarter to move Spring Hill to a 6-point lead.

Hagan Tucker intercepted a pass and returned it 32 yards to set the Panthers up for the score.

A pass interference call placed the ball on the one yard line, and Ta’Vin Hunter scored to give a 19-6 advantage.

Garrett Self recovered a fumble in the fourth quarter followed by a 46-yard drive, including a 17-yard pass from Self to Michael Spurrier and a one-yard touchdown run by Self to give Spring Hill a 26-6 lead.

“The team has worked really hard this year, and they deserved the reward of winning. I’ve received a lot of confidence from them,” Self said.

Self completed nine of 20 passes for 127 yards and 57 yards rushing with one touchdown.

Center tried to score two times in the last four minutes of the game, with both two-point attempts stopped by the Panther’s defense.

The Spring Hill Panthers are on the road tonight to Pleasant Grove, with kick-off at 7:30.

The Spring Hill Blue Brigade received highest ranking at their first competition

Tuesday, October 14, the Spring Hill band traveled to Mout Pleasant to participate in Region IV marching competition, where they received the highest possible ranking of straight 1's, landing them a spot in the area marching competition Saturday, October 25 at Lobo Stadium.

After loading the extra percussion equipment, uniforms, plumes and every instrument, the band was on their way to their first marching contest.

"We were excited, but were ready to prove what kind of band we are," sophomore trumpet player Derek Jordan said.

The Blue Brigade marches with the traditional military marching style, rather than the modern style of a show band. Most judges are accustomed to seeing the corp bands, so the Brigade has to try even harder to get the same rankings.

"We are at a major disadvantage. Even though we have the same skill level, the corp bands are more visually appealing to the audience, since they use sound systems and props, so we have to work extra hard to appear just as appealing as the other bands," said senior trombone player Drew Bienhoff.

The band has put in a great deal of work to prepare for competition season, practicing weekday mornings at 7:30, as well as Monday nights; run-throughs Fridays after school and football games Friday nights are also important practice times.

"It's definitely hard work, but it's totally worth it, because it pays off when we go far," sophomore Payton Long said.

The group is looking to advance to the state level for a second year in a row; advancement is based on their performance at the area competition.
